
Internet Use Risks

 - Disclosure of information can lead to predatory behavior of others
 - Loss of privacy
 - Copyright infringement

Site/App	Description	Be aware of . . .
Twitter	<ul style="list-style-type: none">• Microblog of 280 characters• Friends, news, celebrity tidbits	<ul style="list-style-type: none">• Instant updates• Marketing tool for celebs• If public post, can spread around the internet
Tumblr	<ul style="list-style-type: none">• Short blogs, pics, video and audio clips• Share with friends	<ul style="list-style-type: none">• Offensive content easily found• Publicly viewable by default
FaceTime	<ul style="list-style-type: none">• Similar to Skype• Make video and audio calls	<ul style="list-style-type: none">• Can be hacked

Site/App	Description	Be aware of . . .
YouTube	<ul style="list-style-type: none">• Video sharing	<ul style="list-style-type: none">• Inappropriate content
Instagram	<ul style="list-style-type: none">• Pics and short videos• View, comment, and edit photos with fun effects	<ul style="list-style-type: none">• Publicly accessible by default• Popularity tool• Inappropriate content• “InstaFollow” parental tool
Snapchat	<ul style="list-style-type: none">• App for messaging• Photos and videos display for short time• Share funny and embarrassing pictures with friends	<ul style="list-style-type: none">• Even though the content “disappears,” it never truly disappears• Sexting (sending sexually explicit photos or messages)

Site/App	Description	Be aware of . . .
Google+	<ul style="list-style-type: none">• Social network• Video chats in Hangouts• Primarily used for school	<ul style="list-style-type: none">• Different circles with different content for each• Targeted advertising
Facebook	<ul style="list-style-type: none">• Social networking• Live streaming• Instagram post can be shared through Facebook	<ul style="list-style-type: none">• Shareable information• Publicly accessible by default• Hacking• Ads/spam

Site/App	Description	Be aware of . . .
Musical.ly	<ul style="list-style-type: none">• Video social network• Video sharing	<ul style="list-style-type: none">• Songs and videos containing swearing and sexual content• Sharing of information to get approval
Vine Camera	<ul style="list-style-type: none">• Short, looping videos• Fun, creative, or thought-provoking content	<ul style="list-style-type: none">• Lots of inappropriate videos• Publicly accessible by default

Texting and Email

- Texting is similar to email, but faster.
- Texting is close to real time.
- A computer or mobile device can be used.
- Dangers:
 - Texting and driving: “It can wait”
 - Communication with strangers
 - Not usually anyone there to monitor the activity

Know the Lingo

- Ask your child what abbreviations mean.
- Check websites for information and definitions of texting lingo: <http://www.netlingo.com/>.



Examples of Texting Lingo

- **BFF** = Best Friends Forever
- **BRB** = Be Right Back
- **GTS** = Go To Sleep
- **HBU** = How About You
- **HMP** = Hit My Phone
- **IKR** = I Know That's Right
- **IDC** = I Don't Care
- **IDK** = I Don't Know
- **LOL** = Laugh Out Loud
- **MBN** = Must Be Nice
- **MCM** = Mancrush Monday
- **NVM** = Never Mind
- **RQ** = Real Quick
- **SMH** = Shaking My Head
- **TBH** = To Be Honest
- **TMB** = Text Me Back
- **WCW** = Womancrush Wednesday
- **WYA** = Where You At
- **WYD** = What You Doing

What about common profanity abbreviations?

Technology Moves . . . Fast!

- Technology is said to now change every 6 months or so.
- It is important to keep up with technology so that you can keep up with your kids.
- It also helps you to monitor them more effectively.



You Can Take Action to Keep Your Kids Safe

- Teach your kids to guard privacy.
- Set rules and limits.
- Create parent-child contracts.
- Use online parental controls.
- Do your research.



Setting Rules and Limits

- Allow limited time for internet/technology use each day.
- Keep the computer in a common area.
- Check internet “history.”
- Monitor your child’s use.
- Consider a “contract.”



Online Parental Controls

- Restrict which types of sites your child can view
- Allow parents to choose their child's internet activity
- Decrease internet abuse
- Can be adjusted as your child grows older or as you see fit to change
- Some Options:
 - Net Nanny
 - CyberPatrol
 - CyberSitter
 - We-Blocker



Staying Safe – More Tips

- Keep phones in a central location in the home overnight. For mobile phones, pay for the monthly family safeguards and controls.
- Talk with your kids about internet dangers, including cyberbullying.
- Know what sites and apps your kids are using, and do your research on those sites and apps.
- Know that your kids can also access the internet through gaming devices like PlayStation and Xbox 360.
- Use the CyberTipline **(800) 843-5678** to report pornography and online enticement.

What About Mental/Emotional Health?

Concerns related to social media use/misuse include:

- Low self-esteem
- Negative body image
- Depression
- Internet addiction
- Risky behaviors
- Less connectivity in real life
